FIRST PEOPLES RECONCILIATION MATCH 2024:

A LANDMARK CULTURAL CELEBRATION

During the 2024 First Peoples Reconciliation Game in Rouyn-Noranda, the Huskies, in collaboration with the Minwashin organization, paid tribute to indigenous culture with several noteworthy initiatives.

An original logo, designed by artist Julie-Lise Polson, was proudly worn by the players and produced in promotional items such as caps and wallpapers. This symbol reflects the progress and recognition of the First Peoples. Johnny Kistabish marked the event by describing part of the game on the radio in Anishinabe language, a historic first in Quebec, highlighting the importance of preserving language and cultural traditions. Hockey, which played a significant role in the lives of many residential school survivors, proved a powerful vehicle for memory and reconciliation. An official puck drop brought together members of the indigenous communities from both the Huskies and the Foreurs de Val-d'Or.

In Val-d'Or, an official jersey was also auctioned off, reinforcing the impact of this initiative. The event demonstrated how sport can become a tool for raising awareness and bringing cultures together, while honouring the stories and contributions of First Peoples.







La Sandwicherie:


A SOCIAL ECONOMY MODEL IN THE HEART OF VAL-D'OR

From now on, it will be managed by La Piaule, a shelter for homeless people. This acquisition guarantees the continuity of the products that have made its reputation, in particular the energy bars that regulars love so much. Those who have tried them know...

The restaurant is now operated by the TAPAJ (Alternative work paid by the day) program, which offers work opportunities to participants while supporting the organization's self-financing.

This transition reflects a continuation of the caring values held by the previous owners. They were keen to give back to the community by donating surplus food, supporting cultural and sporting events, or simply offering a cup of coffee to warm up those in need.

Today, this tradition continues, and we're proud that La Sandwicherie continues to embody these values of solidarity while creating new opportunities for the local community.














LOOKING BACK AT AKI TIPATCIMO 2024:

A CELEBRATION OF MEMORIES AND KNOWLEDGE

On September 13, 2024, the Aki Tipatcimo event brought together members of various communities for a day dedicated to exchanging, telling and sharing Anishinabe stories. Organized by the Institut national de la recherche scientifique (INRS), the event offered a unique space to explore deep and rich collective memories.

Inspiring voices such as Donald Wabanonik, Adrienne Jérôme, Kigos Papatie, Régis Penosway, Charlie Papatie, Danny Bisson and many others. Their stories, imbued with emotion and wisdom, captivated all participants.

At the heart of the discussions: memories, place names and stories shaping the Anishinabe identity. This intergenerational exchange revived fragments of the past, while underlining the importance of passing on this knowledge to future generations.







THE BEAR LOGO: A SYMBOL OF IDENTITY AND AUTHENTICITY

For centuries, First Nations have enriched the land through the arts, food, environmental sciences, engineering, fashion, entertainment and much more. The Bear logo, or First Nations Identification, embodies this heritage while affirming a strong identity.

This symbol, represented by a bear, plays a key role for First Nations entrepreneurs and communities.

It allows for quick recognition of the authenticity of Indigenous products and services, while offering protection and increased visibility. More than a logo, the Bear's Imprint is a movement that affirms collective identity and promotes recognition with pride.

Created by Algonquin artist Frank Polson, the Bear logo embodies the values of courage, respect and protection handed down from generation to generation. It is a powerful symbol of self-determination and unity.

Le FabLab

AN INSPIRING STOPOVER IN VAL-D'OR

Last June, Val-d'Or had the privilege of hosting the FabLab, a nomadic workshop orchestrated by the First Peoples Innovation Centre. This unique project aims to reach out to remote or isolated Indigenous youth in communities across Quebec. In Val-d'Or, an all-female cohort took part in an intensive 10-week training program focusing on digital technologies and fabrication. Participants explored tools such as Arduino programming, 3D printing, laser and vinyl cutting, digital milling and digital embroidery. The course enabled them to develop technical skills while giving free rein to their creativity.

By the end of the course, some impressive final products had emerged: sweaters adorned with emblematic animals, personalized coffee mugs for the Kukum, engraved key-rings... An explosion of color and pride marked this achievement.

Crystal Penosway, originally from Kitcisakik, stood out among the trainers. After completing the training, she chose to continue her apprenticeship and share her knowledge with others, becoming an instructor in the process. The Onaki FabLab is not just a space for creation, but a genuine platform for innovation and transmission. It opens up horizons and inspires future generations, while building capacity within indigenous communities.
